## 7:25 pm Leadership Updates — Cherise Ayers, Principal, CHS

- Building Temps: It's hot. The school is a naturally ventilated space. There are five floors of building; it gets warm. They are working in partnership with facilities to make it cooler in the building. They have adjusted the schedule of the vents to open earlier in the nighttime to let cooler air in. Additionally there are skylights that are open as long as it's not raining. They have fans in the hallways and in the classrooms. There is water; please send your kids with water bottles!
  - They're also asking the district what the long term plan is for the Central building. There are a few window units in the offices (for staff who are working there all summer). Could they add more? They are exploring other ideas for helping lower the temps in the building.

  - Last day of school for the seniors is Friday, June 9th. Walk out is at 2:30!

- The graduation is on Monday the 12th at the St. Paul River Center at 8pm.
  Seniors should be there by 7:30 PM! Parking will be tricky! Highland's graduation is immediately before Central's.
- Budget The projected enrollment is 1560
  - This year, our projected enrollment was 1,809
  - Actual enrollment was 1551
  - Next year our projected enrollment is 1560. Estimated allocated FTEs is based on projected enrollment but will change based on actual enrollment.

# **Estimate Allocated FTEs**

- Internal decision was made to retain all staff. They have had some attrition in staff and those vacated positions are not being replaced. They shifted positions to cover gaps, and they are hiring for crucial vacancies (e.g., these are being filled: french teacher, science teacher, social worker, english teacher).
- SCIP Schoolwide Continuous Improvement Plan This is a plan for ensuring the school continuously gets better. Goals are around improving discourse and participation in the classroom. The full plan will be finalized this summer and will be shared next fall.
- Time for questions:
  - What are you working toward for the students? Principal Ayers wants the students to learn more about accountability. Now that we are leaving the pandemic times, there is a need to set more boundaries and teach

accountability. There will be a lot of conversations with the students to socialize this idea. It will be hard to learn that there are firm deadlines, firm rules, etc. but it is really an important shift. Principal Ayers asks parents to lean in as well to be a partner on this.

  - The Office of Teaching and Learning studied best practices, and looked at research studies on outcomes.

Fair and equitable grading is **a journey** with the goal to get to **standards based teaching**, **assessment**, **and grading as the norm** for our teachers and students.

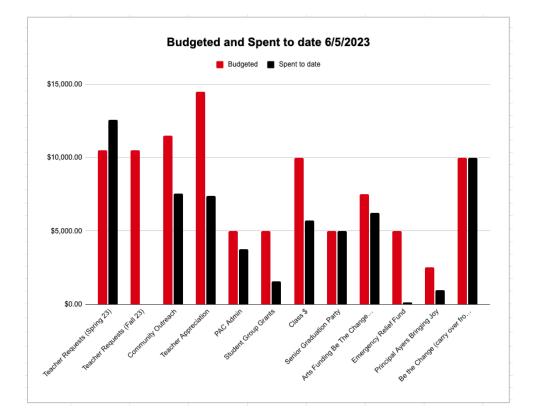
- Central is a stage 2 school. It already has many shared rubrics and there is broad understanding of expectations. More work still needs to be done and will be a partnership between OTL and Central staff/teachers.
- The OTL wants to level the norm, build on the strengths.
- Implementation plan (across Central and all SPPS schools)
  - Goal: Move from more traditional grading practices and move toward more fair and equitable grading practices
  - Student proficiency on shared learning targets aligned with district priority standards.

- This proposal will meet schools where they are and provide differentiated support and timeline organized into 3 stages.

- Central staff and administration is developing:
  - Aligned practices about late work.
  - Standard alternative assessment options.
- OTL is working to have grades be the evidence of learning. The district is working with the staff and administrations within each school to move toward standardization within the school and then across schools. It is being done within partnership and centered on the needs of the students.

- Review of the 2023 Budget -Heidi Van Schooten, PAC Treasurer
  - PAC is changing our fiscal year from the calendar year to the school year (July 1 to June 30th annually). This will help us to budget more effectively. We will be fundraising and budgeting for each school year, not having to budget on the calendar year and operate on the school year.
