## What is Title I?

# The Purpose:

To help **every child** receive a high quality education and to achieve the high academic standards set by the State of Minnesota.



## How is Title I funded?

- Title I funds flow from the U.S. Department of Education to the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE). Then to the school districts.
- The district allocates
   Title I funds to schools
   based on the
   percentage of students
   who receiving free or
   reduced lunch.



#### Free & Reduced Lunch

- 48% of Central students receive free and or reduced lunch

# Eligible Schools in 2023 - 2024

 Many elementary, secondary and alternative schools in Saint Paul receive Title I funds.
 Schools with 40% or more of the students eligible to receive free or reduced priced lunch receive Title I funding. This percentage can change each year.








#### **Central Issues!**

### Title I in the schools...

Each school decides how Title I funds will be used in their school to improve education for all children.

- Data is reviewed by the schools Site Based Leadership Team with Parent input to determine the greatest need for improvement in the school.
- The SBLT, with the input of parents, develops a school improvement plan (SCIP) with specific strategies to improve student achievement across the school.
- Teachers, administrators and parents work together to prioritize how Title I funds will be used to support the school's strategies to improve education for all students.

# Schoolwide Goal

Increase access, persistence, and successful completion for students of color taking advanced courses by 15% each year through implementing a broader 9/10 IB-MYP (Middle Years Program) integrated with Culturally Responsive Instruction, AVID, Approaches to Learning (ATL), PBIS, Restorative Practices (RP) and Social-Emotional Learning (SEL).

100% of 9th and 10th grade teachers implement MYP in their classes by fall 2024.

# **Reading Goal**

The percentage of all students scoring proficient or higher in reading will increase from 62 to 70 percent by Spring 2024 as measured by the MCA III Reading Assessment administered in April 15, 2024.



#### What?

Make deliberate/ research-informed and culturally sustaining efforts to foster literacy motivation and engagement within and across lessons (9-12)

#### Who?

100% of teachers will integrate culturally relevant teaching strategies by June 11, 2024.

#### How?

70% of teachers will implement graphic organizers across content areas as measured by walkthroughs and student work samples by 05/22/2024 70% of teachers will implement summarizing and reflection strategies across content areas as measured by walkthroughs and student work samples by 05/31/2024 70% of teachers will implement IB Approaches to Learning (ATL Skills) across content areas as measured by walkthrough by 5/31/2024.

How?

Supported by District PD, PLC coaching and action cycles teachers and administrators will plan-do-study adjust implementation of TQ&E framework.



TQ&E Practice Profile: "Students see it before we show them and say it before we tell them."

Teachers use questioning to facilitate student discourse around math concepts.

#### **Examples:**

- "Who can restate \_\_\_\_\_'s reasoning in a different way?"
- "Did anyone have the same strategy but would explain it differently?"
- "Did anyone solve the problem in a different way?"
- "Does anyone want to add on to \_\_\_\_\_\_ 's strategy?"
- "Do you agree or disagree? Why?"


The most accurate predictor of student success is neither income or social status, but the extent to which a family is able:
