International Baccalaureate News...

Looking back at 2010-2011:

- Congratulations to every student who worked so hard toward their IB Diplomas!
- Congratulations to every student who took 1 or more IB exam last May!
- Congratulations to every student who took 1 or more IB class last year!

Last year was filled with many, many successes. Harding's IB program boasted 263 students taking 548 IB exams! Japanese, Spanish, Music and Theatre all led the way with high exam results (and some of our scores were above the world average!). These numbers have qualified Harding for the nationally renowned "Challenge Index" -- which annually identifies America's best high schools. Once published by Newsweek, this list is now maintained by the Washington Post. To find a place on this list, schools must have given at least as many IB or AP exams as the school had graduating seniors. This recognition raises our profile statewide and nationally.

We are proud to declare that five of our IB Diploma Candidates earned the rigorous IB Diploma last May—the ultimate academic achievement at Harding.

Harding's IB graduates from 2011 are currently in college, attending schools like St. John's/St. Ben's University (MN), Carleton College (MN), Macalester College (MN), University of Minnesota (Mpls and Duluth, MN), St. Cloud (MN), St Kate's (MN), St Thomas (MN) and St. Olaf (MN).

Looking forward to 2011-2012:

- Harding's IB program continues to grow, with more and more students challenging themselves with IB classes. It is our goal that EVERY student who attends Harding takes at least one IB class during their four years. We are also proud to be the only school in St. Paul (and among the few in the upper Midwest) offering Film IB.
- The class of 2012 has 15 students striving to earn the IB Diploma. These students will take at least 3 "Higher Level" and 3 "Standard Level" IB classes and exams, as well as complete an Extended Essay, "Creativity, Action & Service" (CAS) hours and expand their minds with the Theory of Knowledge class. Free and Reduced Lunch

If you have not completed and returned your family's Free or Reduced lunch form please do this today! Qualifying for Free or Reduced lunch is a lot more than just lunch! Your child can receive reduced athletic fees, free tutoring services, and more scholarship opportunities. The school receives more federal funding and qualifies for more grants. A new form is required every year unless you receive welfare then your qualification is automatic and an application is not needed. You only need one from for the entire family. Earth Club News

Free Tutoring

Harding offers Extended Day everyday after school. This service is open to every Harding student. Help is available for all subjects. There is additional help for writing, reading and math for students needing to pass the GRAD required tests. If you qualify for Free or Reduced Lunch and your child needs help with reading, writing or math there is free tutoring available from private vendors. Information and registration forms were mailed by the District. You have until October 29, 2011 to return the applications. At conferences, October 13 and 17, and at the Parent Meeting on October 10, 2011 you may register your child for tutoring.



RIF

Once again this year Harding students will be receiving three free books through the Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) Program. Nearly 6,000 books will be given away. RIF is a federally funded program whose goal is to motivate students to read by providing them with three books, of their own choosing, which are theirs to keep. The RIF books will be identified with a sticker inside the front cover that says RIF and the student's name. Be on the lookout for these books coming home and encourage your student to take advantage of this fabulous opportunity!

SPPS Apps

Through a district initiative called "SPPS Apps," now in its fourth year, students have a Google-powered school e-mail. They also have their own Google Docs accounts which can be accessed on their personal SPPS Apps webpage. This program makes it possible for students to save papers and presentations online in their SPPS Apps account and access it both at home and at school, or wherever they have internet access.

Harding Knight Navy

The "Knight Navy" - Harding's Naval Junior ROTC unit is now in its eighteenth year of existence, and is starting the school year with a Battalion enrollment of 195 cadets.

This year's dedicated Battalion Staff is Bi Xiong - Battalion Commander, Alex Pha – Executive Officer, Keng Vang – Operations, Leighton Syring – Administration, Ger Vang – Supply, Evenlina Vang – Public Affairs, Qudus Rahmon – Community Service, and Kee Yang – Battalion Master Chief. Congratulations to these cadet leaders.

NJROTC is an elective credit class that focuses on citizenship, self-discipline and leadership traits. There are four NJROTC extra-curricular teams that compete in local and inter-state competitions with other JROTC units. These teams are Precision Drill with Tommy Xiong as drill team commander, Color Guard with the team commander as yet undetermined, Academic Team with Keng Vang as team captain, and the revered Knight Navy Physical Fitness Team with Nao Lor as team captain. Last March, at the Area 3 West seven-state regional drill competition, involving NJROTC units from 18 schools, Harding's Drill Team brought home the fourth place trophy, and the Knight Navy Physical Fitness Team once again dominated in physical fitness as we had done in the four years prior. We are determined to retain this much respected status for the sixth straight year and remain true to the Battalion's motto that "push-ups make you smarter."

By the time this article is published, the Knight Navy will have hosted on Saturday, October 1, our third inter-school competition, the third annual "Great Northern All Team Sport (GNATS)" Blowout. As the name suggests, only team sports were conducted. JROTC cadets from eight schools competed in single-elimination tournaments in Basketball, Volleyball, Dodge Ball, Flag Football, Soccer, Kickball, and a mile-and-a-quarter Relay Race. Team members of the first place team in each of the sports were awarded medals to wear on their uniforms, and the overall winning JROTC unit was awarded possession of the GNATS Busted Ball Traveling Trophy until the next GNATS competition the first Saturday in October next year. Results from this year's Blowout will be published in a future newsletter. Hopefully, it will state that we retained possession of the trophy for another year. We won last year, but Fargo's Air Force JROTC unit took first place the year before and drove far away with the Busted Ball traveling trophy.

Upcoming competitions include Como Park's "Devil Dog" drill meet on October 29th, and hopefully Washington Technology Magnet's "Destroyer" Drill Meet some time in December. The final competition of the year will be held in early March – the Area Three West Drill Competition in Great Lakes, Illinois. A coach bus will carry 45 dedicated and trained cadets to compete against 17 to 20 other NJROTC units from a seven state region. Events include precision drill, color guard, academic test, personnel inspection and physical fitness. Training has already commenced.

The NJROTC Battalion would like to thank Harding administration, counseling staff, teaching staff, and custodians for their invaluable support of our program and salute the parents for supporting their cadets before and during these competitions – BRAVO ZULU ("Well done in Navy parlance").



Harding's AVID Program

Advancement Via Individual Determination, or AVID, is a college-prep program designed 27 years ago by a San Diego teacher that has quietly swept across much of the country. Nationally, the program says, 94 percent of participants graduate from high school and enroll in college. That figure includes students who go to community colleges and other schools with noncompetitive admissions, but AVID is designed for students in the middle.

Harding's AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) Program continues to be the largest in Minnesota. This college access program is fortunate to have college educated tutors focus on math skills every Thursday and critical thinking skills in other core subjects on Tuesdays. College visits and team building activities are also a part of this program. Recently, 46 ninth graders and 4 days later 38 tenth graders went to Fort Snelling State Park. The students canoed, worked on team building activities and hiked. AVID and Wilderness Inquiry give intercity students opportunities to experience new things and put their team building skills to use.

Harding AVID is extremely grateful to Travelers' for providing students with planners, binders and dividers. These tools will help the AVID students to be even more successful.

American Indian Studies

American Indian Studies (AIS) is off to a great start this year! We are excited to be part of the monthly **Parent Involvement Nights** at Harding, with a break-out group for parents and students interested in developing and supporting the AIS Program. Notice to Parents and Guardians Pesticide Application August, 2011

Dear Parent or Guardian:

In accordance, with Minnesota Statute §121A.30, **Pesticide Application at Schools**, all persons at this school are advised that an estimated schedule of applications of pesticides is available in the school office for review and copying. Attached is a copy of that schedule for your records.

In addition, any person who wishes to be notified of any variation from the scheduled applications may be so notified if specifically requested.

If you would like to be notified prior to pesticide applications made on days other than those specified in the estimated schedule (excluding emergency applications), please complete and return the attached form. If requesting notification via the U.S. Mail, please include **five** self-addressed, stamped envelopes.

This statue also requires that you be told that the long-term health effects on children from the application of such pesticides or the class of chemicals to which they belong may not be fully understood.

If you have questions regarding this notice, contact the school office. Please note that nothing in this law affects the duty of a parent/guardian or a student to comply with the compulsory attendance law. In other words, any student must have an excused absence if they are not present.
