- 1 SPPS uses a one-to-one quarter-to-credit system in which each quarter course earns one credit. A year-long, four-quarter course is worth four credits; a semester-long, two-quarter course is worth two credits; a quarter-long course is worth one credit.
 - In four-period-block-scheduled schools, each quarter continues to earn one credit, but block quarter credits are worth two regular schedule quarter credits. For example, students earning two-quarter credits in English at a four-period-block-scheduled school will have completed English standards equivalent to four regular quarter credits.
- 2 All state credit requirements on this chart have been converted to SPPS credit definitions and are uniform at all sites, regardless of schedule.
- 3 Depending on their local programs and schedules, individual schools can require additional credits beyond the district baselines outlined here.
- 4 All SPPS credits at all sites in all subject areas are standards-based. In areas in which the state has not defined standards or specific credit requirements, the district has done so.
- 5 86 total credits (64 required and 22 elective) are required for graduation from all non-block scheduled SPPS high schools commencing with the class of 2012. 56 (32 required and 24 elective) total block quarter credits are required at four-period block-scheduled schools.
