

School Attendance Matters (SAM): Students Under 12 years old

What is SAM?

SAM is a Saint Paul Public School District initiative aimed at improving attendance as well as explaining the truancy process to families and guardians.

What is Minnesota law regarding school attendance?

Once enrolled in school, a child 7 years old to 17 years old (unless already graduated from High School), must attend school every day, every class, on time, unless lawfully excused.

What is considered an excused absence or tardy?

How can I Avoid SAM Action?

Parent/Guardian must communicate every time a child is absent. **Please note not all absences will be excused even when communicated to school staff**. Call or send a note to the main office and state the reason for the absence (be specific as to why your child missed school).
