School Goals

Reading: The percentage of all students scoring at least proficient in Reading will increase from 20% to 30% by Spring 2020 as measured by the MCAIII Reading Assessment in April 2020

Math: The percentage of all students scoring at least proficient in Math will increase from 20% to 30% by Spring 2020 as measured by the MCAIII Math Assessment in April 2020.

Science: The percentage of Fifth Grade students scoring proficient or higher in Science will increase from 18% to 28% by Spring 2020 as measured by the MCAIII Science Assessment in April 2020.

In the Classroom

Teachers will use culturally relevant curriculum and personalized engagement strategies (for academics and social emotional learning) supporting students' success. Key connections with families include:

- Family Academic Engagement nights focused on Literacy/ Math/ Cultural Relevancy, and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) will include opportunities for activities supporting linguistic affinity and interpretation.
- Engaging families through relationship and supportive academic extension materials to help students practice their skills at home.
- Whole school, grade level and classroom web pages with up to date resources for students and parents around culture, academics, activities and opportunities to partner as volunteers.

At Home

Eastern Heights families joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support student success in academics and social emotional learning. Families connections include:

- Will make sure that children attend school every day and arrive on time.
- Will talk with our children about school and what they are learning every day.
- Will use the website and newsletters to stay informed about school-wide and classroom activities.
- Will attend Parent-Teacher Conferences, Family Engagement nights and PTO meetings.
