Jackson Preparatory School School Continuous Improvement Plan (SCIP) Summary

"Jackson provides a safe, nurturing, respectful and inclusive environment that offers all children opportunities for acceleration and enrichment to develop their full potential and prepare them to be successful, responsible citizens."

Nyob zoo! Jackson Preparatory believes that children are everyone's priority. Our teachers, parents, community partners, and the St. Paul Promise Neighborhood Initiative are all committed to nurturing each student as a remarkable individual. With two computer labs and iPads for every teacher and student, educational technology is integrated in daily instruction and curriculum to accelerate learning inside and outside of the classroom. Our classroom curriculum is enhanced by specialists in Science, Music, Physical Education, Technology, and Hmong Language and Culture. All students have the opportunity to examine their own culture, language, history, and traditions, with a unique school-wide focus on Hmong Studies.

Jackson Hmong Dual Language Program Hmong Dual Language is offered at all grade levels, Pre-K through 5. Dual language is an educational model in which students are taught core content in two languages. Each year, as students progress to the next grade level, they become increasingly proficient in both Hmong and English. Our Hmong Dual Language Program has been designed for all students, native and non-native Hmong speakers.

Reading SMART Goal:

The percentage of students meeting grade level standards in reading will increase from 21% to 27% by Spring 2019 as measure by the Spring 2019 state standardized reading test (MCA).

Teachers will work together during planning time, participate in professional development, and co-teach to:

- Implement daily independent reading that includes rigorous expectations for each student.
- Plan meaningful small group lessons that provide each student with what they need based on FAST and HRA assessments.

Math SMART Goal:

The percentage of students meeting grade level standards in math will increase from 17% to 23% by Spring 2019 as measure by the Spring 2019 state standardized math test (MCA).

Teachers will work together during planning time, participate in professional development, and co-teach to:

Create systematic expectations for the use of Math Notebooks in grades preK- 5.

PBIS/School Culture

Teachers and Staff will work together to ensure:

- All students follow the 4 Bes; Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Safe, and Be a Learner.
- All students will be taught the MindUp Curriculum to help gain strategies to support their social/emotional well being.
