ABSTRACT

300 words maximum. NOT an introduction, but instead an overview of the EE. Best if written last. The abstract is to be placed immediately after the title page on its own separate page. Its purpose is to allow readers to quickly understand the contents of your EE.

Must contain the following:

- the research question being investigated
- the scope of the investigation
- the conclusion(s) of your EE

TABLE OF CONTENTS

(do not need to include Abstract or Table of Contents)

Your table of contents should include the titles of the different sections of your EE + on what page numbers these sections can be found.

EXAMPLE:

YOUR EXTENDED ESSAY BEGINS!

Remember to clearly label each section. You can label sections in a variety of ways....like this, for example:

Introduction

or

INTRODUCTION

or

Introduction

...but whatever you do, don't be "cute" or overly "creative." The goal is to simply and directly communicate what part of the paper the reader is currently reading.

Double spacing is easier on examiners' eyes.

It is okay to include images and graphics/charts within the text of your essay if they are applicable.

Any images / graphs / charts that are non-essential (but still interesting and relevant) should be placed in appendices.

BODY OF ESSAY (7 - 10 pages or so)

CONCLUSION (a page or two, normally)

BIBLIOGRAPHY / REFERENCES / ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Having trouble citing a source? Try using EasyBib.com

Remember: you need a *variety* of sources.

You can break it into different sections if you'd like. For example: Works Cited and Works Consulted

APPENDIX (or Appendices if you have more than one)

Note: these are *not* an essential section of the EE and examiners are not required to read them, so ensure that everything essential to your essay is actually found in the body of your essay.

Do not try to evade the EE word limit by placing essential information in your appendices

Do not constantly refer to the appendices as this can disrupt the flow of your writing.

List them as "Appendix A" and "Appendix B," etc.
